American Missionaries 2nd in a Series

James and Ethel Chapman 1916—1950

Missionary of the Microscope by Ligaya Magbanua Simpkins

The growth of Silliman Institute was marked each year by auspicious events and 1916 was no exception. That year marked the inauguration of the new Sci-

ence building and the arrival of the Chapmans from Boston with 10 compound microscopes to add to the instruments assembled by other pioneer science teachers. Thus, Dr. James W. Chapman became

known as the "Missionary of the Microscope".

Dr. Chapman's interest in nature led to an M.A. (Park College, 1907) and a Doctor of Science in Economic Entomology (Harvard University, 1913). This educational background along with his teaching experience in Physics and Biology, work experience at the USDA and work as a Boston City Entomologist, brought a new dimension of teaching and research to Silliman.

Upon his arrival, Dr. Chapman began to serve Silliman in various capacities. He took charge of the Department of Science and was the Head of the Biology Department for many years. In 1918, after consultation by Dr. Chapman with the faculty of the University of the Philippines, the pre-medical curriculum was established, necessitating the addition of organic chemistry and qualitative analysis to his teaching load which already included biology, zoology and comparative anatomy.

He took on the roles of being a Sunday School superintendent, elder in the church, bible teacher, and served as Dean of Graduate School (1935-1941)



and Dean of the College of Science (1946-47), all while serving as the vice-President of Silliman from 1937 until his retirement in 1950.

Ethel Robinson Chapman graduated from Park College in 1907, magna cum laude, specializing in Mathematics and Science. At Silli-

man, however, she was drawn into the field of English when she was (See CHAPMANS next page)

asked to take over an English class, teach the history of Education and work out a course study where the only textbook available was a small volume of Bacon's essays. Having gained a reputation for excellence and being a master teacher in English Composition and Literature and the Literature of the Bible, Silliman University conferred its first honorary degree in 1950 — Master of Arts, *honoris causa* — to Ethel Chapman in recognition of her career as a missionary teacher.

The Chapmans survived the war years under extremely difficult circumstances in a Japa-



nese concentration camp near Manila. Upon their return in 1947, Dr. Chapman personally supervised the rehabilitation of the science departments of Silliman.

Dr. Chapman had also acquired fame for his ant collection. With only 76 species of Philippine ants known then, he successfully identified over 500 species of ants, 150 of which were new. His list of ants of Asia was published by the Institute of Science and Technology before his retirement after which he continued his correspondence with fellow entomologists around the world.

Friends and former students established the James W. Chapman Research Foundation upon his retirement to encourage "research in the fields of knowledge of value to society, industry and government". When Mrs. Chapman died unexpectedly after her retirement, her husband and children James Robinson, John A. and Katherine, established the Ethel Chapman Scholarship in her memory.

One colleague wrote "Whatever Ethel Chapman did, it was done quietly with no thought of praise...but with a real desire to help".

After 34 years at Silliman, the community's sentiments were expressed in the dedication of the 1950 Portal yearbook: "With their retirement, Silliman loses able minds, noble hearts. We, the students, shall miss firm but gentle guiding hands—two great teachers—and two great friends."
