She listed continuing support for Silliman University and alumni affairs, community outreach projects, member activities, fundraising campaigns and during the year hosting alumni and friends visiting San Diego including President Ben Malayang and wife Gladys, and Rev. Nihal Attanayake, director of the United Universalist Church of the Philippines (UUCP) who completed theological training at Silliman University.

Laarni also revealed future plans to be discussed during the first meeting scheduled for Jan. 21.

SUAF@SD has provided solid support to the Silliman University Alumni Council of North America (SUACONA), recently funding one of the rooms in the newlyestablished Silliman Student Center. The chapter also sponsors a scholar at SU, Jason Tubog.

## Rev. Gordon and Helen Mahy: 1949—1961

Rev. **Gordon** and **Helen Mahy** came to Silliman with their five children, **Don, Carol, Helen (Popsie), Ken** and **Tressa** in 1949. The Mahys were Presbyterian missionaries in Tsingtao until the Communists took over China.

Gordon served as minister of Silliman University Church in 1952-53, taught English and at the College of Theology. Blessed with an excellent



singing voice, he sang with university choral groups. Rev. Mahy also served in the University Cabinet representing the religious departments and interests.

A love for English literature led to a B.A. degree in 1924 and a masters degree in 1926 from the University of Pennsylvania. He received a Master of Theology from Princeton Theological Seminary and later was awarded a Doctor of Divinity at Lewis and Clark College (Portland, OR).

"Tio Gordo" was well known for his story-telling program at DYSR featuring kids on campus. He loved reading aloud to his wife in that well-known booming voice.

Helen Mahy, a graduate of Wilson College (Chambersburg, PA), worked at DYSR, the Christian Broadcasting station that Silliman had started, serving as one of the directors, writing scripts for programs and other duties.

In 1961, the Mahys left Silliman partly because of health issues and returned to Warren Wilson College (Asheville, NC). He previously served as campus minister there during the



war years and resumed teaching there until his retirement. Dr. Mahy passed away in 1988. Helen Mahy remained in North Carolina with family members until her peaceful death in 2001.

While at Silliman, the Mahy children were active in school sports and in many music programs. The Mahys' love of music was well known to friends and neighbors who listened to music wafting from their home.

Don became a fine artist and ended up teaching art in the small college of Mars Hill (NC). He died at a fairly young age from cancer. Carol, the family historian, went to Princeton Theological Seminary as did Tressa. Carol is presently active in prison ministry. Popsie (Helen), involved in campus ministry for years following graduation from Union Seminary (Richmond, VA), works for a large business in the Philadelphia area.

Kenneth studied music at Westminster Choir College in Princeton and continues to compose. He has published many pieces and his music has been sung around the country. Tressa married a fellow seminarian, **Rob Mangum**, who was in church ministry for 30 years before retiring. Tressa has been working at the University of Colorado the past 15 years (currently in the office of Academic Support and Advising). She continues to be active in the church choir and in the Greeley Chorale.

A classmate wrote Tressa "I know that your family has shown us what God's grace is and we are fortunate through these years to look back and remind ourselves how your parents and you have shown us the face of God."
